


SIKH HUMAN RIGHTS GROUP



The Sikh Human Rights Group (SHRG) was established in 1985. Since 2015 it has had Special ECOSOC Consultative Status at the UN. It is formed on principles of Sikh worldview and philosophy of pluralism, respect, dignity, diversity, reverence for nature and governance by consensus. Until 1993 SHRG focus was on human rights violations in India with particular focus on Panjab. After 1993, SHRG widened its interests in Diversity and Sustainable Development. The areas of interest further increased to incorporate Sewa and Governance. Currently the broad areas of SHRG work are,

- Human Rights, Responsibilities and Duties
- 2 Sustainable Development and Environment
- 3 Diversity
- Governance and Pluralism
- 5 Sewa.





The Sikh Human Rights Group is an international entity with central office in UK. It has members in Canada, USA, India, Brazil, South Africa, Spain and Thailand.

Sikh Human Rights Group is a non political organisation and does not seek to represent any particular community or group. It promotes Sikh perspectives in international issues on current and prospective issues facing the world in general, together with its volunteers and affiliates



ORGANISATION STRUCTURE

SHRG has members from several communities.

SHRG day to day work is run by a Director.

The structure of SHRG is:

Voting members

- A Board of Governors who decide on broad policy
- An Executive Board that decides specific policies in their areas of speciality
- **Members** These are generally individuals who have worked with SHRG for 3 years on a project or in its administration and can vote on their area of interest.



Non Voting members

- Volunteer Members are individuals who work on special projects or fields of interest without remuneration.
- Supporting Members are individuals and institutions who give financial and occasional support to SHRG
- **Affiliates:** these are voluntary sector organisations in their own right who have similar interests to SHRG and coordinate as well as network their work of interest with SHRG

SHRG will be setting up a board of Patrons, Advisors and Consultants in time.

AREAS OF WORK AND PROJECTS

There are many treaties and Declarations at the United Nations covering several fields. Many are inter related. It is difficult to list all of the work we do with various sections of the UN. This is a broad list.

OVERARCHING THEMES

HUMAN RIGHTS, RESPONSIBILITIES AND DUTIES

Most of SHRG work initially focussed on documenting violations in Panjab. These were extrajudicial executions, torture, disappearances, illegal and involuntary detentions, refugees, asylum cases, review of legal instruments etc

Most current work is on thematic issues such as Death Penalty, Convention on Torture, Right to Fair Trials, cultural aspects of human rights etc

SHRG is also looking at principles of responsibilities and duties that have historically been the basis of ensuring human dignity and respect as well as good governance in some civilisations. SHRG is researching whether these have the same outcomes as human rights.

Transnationals and Human Rights

SHRG has been promoting accountability of Businesses particularly Transnational Corporations in the field of human rights since 1996. It is an active participant in the sessions on Business and Human Rights as well as Transnational Corporations and Human Rights at the UN.

DIVERSITY

After participating in the World Conference Against Racism in which SHRG contributed to three themes, namely Cultural Diversity, Diversity and Sikhs, SHRG has developed a substantive interest in diversity and pluralism.

SHRG is trying to promote a UN Convention on Diversity and a UN Day on Diversity.

SHRG considers diversity to be a natural phenomenon in its various manifestations, such as race, colour, ethnicity, culture, gender, lifestyles, freedom of thought and feels that States should adopt pro active programmes of action in making society at ease with diversity.

Minorities

SHRG attends the Forum on Minorities and promotes that minorities should be able to self describe themselves rather than through current lenses of religious, ethnicity etc.

Neurodiversity

To make those with lifelong neurological characteristics further accepted in society and integrated successfully with the world. To make the world more meaningful, pleasant and accessible environment for children and adults with neurodiverse characteristics.

GENDER

SHRG promotes dignity and respect for every human being irrespective of their gender, lifestyle and background. We work to remove gender based rights etc that have worked successfully for hundreds of years in some

PLURALISM

SHRG believes that peace in the future of the world will be dependent on accepting pluralism and coexistence of civilisations rather than universalism. It is looking at several aspects of how civilisations' pluralism can be incorporated into international institutions.

Civilisations go back more than 10000 years at least. Many civilisations have well developed concepts on many aspects of human life and human relations with each other, environment and other species. They all try and promote a better and sustainable world. However their concepts and worldviews are different and have developed differently although attempting to achieve the same goals. Sikh Human Rights Group believes that the plurality of worldviews, concepts and practices need to be nurtured and promoted for sustainable future with dignity, respect and coexistence.

SHRG is working with some other organisations in exploring broadening terminology so that the essential features of different civilisations and worldviews can best be understood to promote a plural world at peace with itself.

SUSTAINABLE DEVELOPMENT GOALS, ENVIRONMENT AND CLIMATE

SHRG supports most of the 17 Sustainable Development Goals set by the United Nations for common welfare and development of humanity, ecodiversity and the earth. SHRG is working to try and make SDGs civil society friendly so the work of civil society can be appreciated at the international level.

SHRG feels that most UN conventions and policies on environment and climate are based on the outlook of one civilisation and culture. It feels that climate change and threats to environment will be taken more seriously by communities around the world if they are encouraged to develop ethics based on their own cultures and civilisations. We believe that the environmental and climate crises is too urgent and threatening to engage in politics of hegemony. Examples include Indian cosmological perspectives, African Ubuntu systems, Chinese Confucian approach, Islamic perspectives, western perspectives and so on.

SHRG is also working on issues of small farms. It takes the view that small farms are better for the environment, climate, ecodiversity, communities, families, poverty reduction and food sovereignty. SHRG believes that small farms should have subsidies and be protected. SHRG wishes to see changes at WTO or bring the Agreement on Agriculture under UNCTAD.

Projects in pipeline under Sustainable Development.

Worldviews of nature website and library. An online library and database of different approaches and practices around environment. The library will have academic papers, write up on practices, views of experts and civil society.

SHRG wrote the book Universalism and Ethics of Environment for UNESCO.





GOVERNANCE AND CONFLICT RESOLUTION

SHRG takes the view that power has to be accountable and the best form of governance is that which has the widest consensus. It sees majoritarian democracy as one of the options in this but also problematic in some civilisations and cultures. SHRG looks at whether power is accountable. SHRG also feels State governance policies can tackle Poverty reduction, Housing, Inclusivity. Minority rights

Conflict Resolution. SHRG has been engaged in conflict resolution. Currently it is assisting in resolution of conflict between India and Sikh separatists.

SEWA.

This is voluntary work without rewards.

SHRG has its own project called GURSEVA PROJECT which incorporates activities of some voluntary sector organisation in self less voluntary work on reducing hunger, social issues, housing etc

CURRENT ACTIVE PROJECTS

BUSINESS AND HUMAN RIGHTS

Volunteers can research into latest UN position in any particular field of Business and Human Rights, assist in formulating a position and attend a UN meeting.

These areas can be for instance how countries ensure human rights compliance by Businesses, how individuals can get redress from Transnationals in third country, whether an international Court should be set up on conduct of Transnational Corporations.

Volunteers can learn about discussions going on at UN and get an idea of latest developments in international law on Transnational Corporations.

Volunteers can lobby countries and other NGOs to support SHRG position that Transnational Corporations should be more accountable.

DIVERSITY

Volunteers can take up one or other areas within Diversity, such as Race and Ethnicity, Gender, Disability, Culture. Lifestyles etc

Volunteers can look at legal framework, loopholes, or compliance among countries.

We encourage exploring this as well. We do not support the idea of superior civilisations and inferior civilisations.
